The Armor of God, the fruits of the Spirit, the Hebrew names for God – these are a few of the topics that I've been talking about in our morning staff meetings. Everyday the staff of the Youth Center (about 25 people) meets for a time of singing, prayer, and a little devotional thought for the day. About a month ago Ze Augusto (the National Director of YFC Guinea-Bissau) asked me if I would take charge of those meetings. At first I was a little nervous, because about 30 people come each morning and it's all in Creole, but I decided to do it and I'm so glad that I did!

Other people lead the singing (that's a good thing...) then I've been leading about ten minutes of prayer for different things and giving a five minute devotional. It's been a really fun way to stretch my Creole a little each day and to share things that God's been putting on my heart. Several of the people who work at the Youth Center have been Christians for less than five years and don't have a lot of knowledge of the Bible, so it's been fun to see people learn things for the first time that I had the privilege of learning in Sunday school growing up.

About two weeks ago a student that came to class early and was sitting on the sidelines during the devotional thought for the day decided to give his life to Christ. He heard me talking about the armor of God and standing strong against the attacks of Satan and he decided that he wanted to know more about the God that I was speaking about. (Not really a traditional salvation message, but God works in all kinds of ways!!!) He's been coming back every day for discipleship and he's already growing a ton. I wrote all about it in my blog. We got to see several people baptized in the nearby river the first week and were able to have a service with them the second, in the middle of which the lights turned on for the first time to lots of clapping! Thanks for enabling us be here and giving us the opportunity to bless other people that are also working to make a difference in Guinea-Bissau!
