Big Picture Youth Center by Jason

While our various projects progress, it's easy for me to get lost in the details of network wiring, welding, painting, and fixing machines. I love working on the stuff I get to work on, but sometimes I get worn out if I don't step back and take a look at the big picture. The school is making a big difference, touching a lot of lives, and we're blessed to be able to be involved in it.

The geek in me is super excited about the solar project for the sake of the project itself. Not many people get a chance to design and install a system this big! More than a ton of solar panels, a ton of batteries, half a ton of copper, and enough power to run a whole school! Ar ar ar arrr!!! As much fun as the project itself is though, its purpose is more important. The project is going to help stabilize the finances of one of the very few self supporting outreach projects in Guinea-Bissau. By knocking out about \$800 of our \$6,000 budget each month (which pays all of the staff, maintains the network, facilities, two generators, a truck, etc.) we'll give the center a large amount of breathing room – which will be a relief from barely keeping its head above water each month! The idea that the school will live on after all of the Americans leave is a novel one in this part of the world, and I'm truly proud to be a part of it.

YFC in Guinea-Bissau is doing some awesome stuff. Our English school is widely recognized as the best in the country. The different departments of the school (English/French/Computers) had 812 students coming through every day last month! Our classes are powerful outreach tools, clearly presenting the Gospel as part of the course material, giving our students an opportunity to understand what Christ has done for them. I'm glad to be here at this time, adding our contribution to what all of the missionaries, workers, and supporters that have come before us have built. Please continue to pray for what God will do through YFC in Guinea-Bissau!

Ironically, as we're getting closer and closer to getting the solar system up and running to replace the generator, the generator itself has been having tons of problems. This is making my husband slightly crazy because he hasn't been able to use the drill press or the big welder or several other tools that would make the solar installation go much faster. He has, however, been forging ahead, using his Atkins ingenuity, and finding lots of long ways to accomplish simple tasks.

The most exciting developments of the past month were the two giant doors nearly finished and installed on the shop; and the room to hold the batteries, chargers, inverters, and all of the other hardware that connects to the solar panels being under construction! Jason has also been installing



video cameras and getting supports made for the fencing because he wants to get the security system up and running before the first panel is installed.

This next month will be some of the most complicated and dangerous work because Jason will be wiring up the massive battery bank to the powerful solar controllers, and connecting the generators to the whole thing to top it off. Please pray for wisdom and safety for him and our real electrician, Djombo.
