Computer Classes: If you know your way around Microsoft Office enough to write a letter or put a few simple formulas into a spreadsheet we'd love to have you come out for one

We'd love to have someone come over for three to six months to work with our accountant in Quickbooks to figure out some of our more complicated transactions and help to produce timely reports to allow the Youth Center to make more informed financial decisions.

English Writing Teacher: If you speak English and you like to write we'd love to have you come over for one to six months to teach a writing class. We've got tons of students who would love more practice writing letters, essays, summaries, poems, songs, basically anything you can think of. I already have tons of ideas for the curriculum, but don't have enough time to teach it myself.
