## First Fruits! *by Jason*

We are delighted to announce that the first drinking water filters from the factory project are in the homes of paying customers! This is a significant milestone for the project and hopefully the first of thousands of families protected from water-born diseases like cholera and E.coli in Guinea-Bissau where those diseases take such a significant toll on the health of so many people.



Richard was only able to stay for a week on this semi-annual trip, but we had a full calendar and were able to accomplish a lot. We had scheduled a product launch at the factory ahead of time, and had some important steps remaining before we'd have a batch of filters ready to present. We worked out a way to attach spigots to the buckets we'd purchased. He also figured out and trained the Guinean workers on the procedure to apply the all-important anti-bacterial colloidal silver treatment to the filters.

The factory project has been years in the making, and while Richard was telling everyone that we have "finally arrived at the beginning" since there is still so much work ahead of us, it was a sweet victory to see the first filters in the hands of happy customers and the product launch covered on national TV.

We will now begin the long processes of incrementally improving our production pace and yield, driving down production cost per filter, figuring out packaging, and establishing our sales and distribution channels. The project has come so far, and we're still a long way from the final goal of a self-supporting factory that can make enough filters to satisfy the demand for a safe, low-cost drinking water solution - but we're extremely grateful for how far we have already come and endlessly optimistic about the possibility that we'll arrive at that goal eventually!
