This month was a busy one, but marked an important milestone in the urgency of the last 12 months. We completed roofing the quarter of the new shop building that will hold the machine shop! Much of our work over the last year has

been focused on getting this space ready, collecting equipment and supplies to send over in the container, and unloading the container last month. We had a lot of fun while we were in the U.S., but most of the time since last May has been one deadline looming after another: first getting the site ready for us to go back to the U.S. for furlough, then visiting everyone and buying all of the material/equipment to send in the container, then packing it all up and getting it shipped off, then having this space ready to receive and store the stuff before the rainy season starts. With a great sigh of relief, I'm happy to announce that we (with much help!) managed it and the new arrivals are safe from the impending rain.

This wing of the new shop is similar in size than my whole existing shop at the old vocational school. The work of getting the new space ready has been a key goal over this last year not only to have space for this new equipment, but also because very soon we'll be able to begin migrating equipment over from the current shop. We don't have much furniture yet, so it's just a simple mattress on the floor arrangement for now, but with 24/7 power, running water, and a gorgeous view of the river, it's nicer than most hotels in Guinea-Bissau.
